2019 has been an extraordinary year for Enrich! Our team has worked hard to boost our outreach efforts to the increasing numbers of domestic workers coming to Hong Kong, strengthen government relations and raise awareness of the important role these workers play in meeting our care gap.

We're incredibly proud to have engaged 19,201 participants in 2019 through our education and outreach programmes - our highest yearly reach so far! We were also honoured to see this work recognised by the Investor and Financial Education Council who awarded Enrich the Financial Education Champion award for the second year.

Additionally, in 2019 we released the groundbreaking report 'The Value of Care' with our partner Experian, revealing that migrant domestic workers contributed a whopping HK\$98.9 billion to Hong Kong's economy in 2018. With the incredible international and local media coverage the report received and the important dialogue it continues to inspire, we hope this positive, empowering narrative of domestic work contributes towards long-term change.

We're grateful to our partners, funders, donors and supporters who make our work possible, and who continue to support our mission to ensure that ALL domestic workers have access to life-changing financial education.

Our Approach

We believe that financial and empowerment education changes lives, empowering migrant domestic workers in Hong Kong with the tools to overcome the challenges they face.

Our interactive workshops and activities run on weekends and public holidays, in native languages of domestic workers (including Tagalog and Bahasa Indonesia), equipping them with skills, knowledge and confidence to escape debt, plan for their future and achieve their goals. We are impartial and do not sell or promote any financial products as part of our programmes in order to create a safe, trusted learning environment.





Our Impact

Impact is very important to us. After every workshop or programme, our evaluation process allows us to assess how we can better meet migrant domestic workers' needs. Here is what our participants gain from our financial and empowerment education programme.

Graduate Spotlight

Frances Sheena Galindo

Frances Sheena Galindo (Sheena) is one of our Enrich Ambassadors who returned home to the Philippines in 2019 to manage her own successful online social enterprise. Here is her inspirational story of how she became a debt-free entrepreneur and investor in 5 years.

"My parents couldn't afford to send me to college, so my sister who was a domestic helper in Hona Kona supported my parents to send me to a good school. I was a private nurse for about 4 years.



I came to Hong Kong because my family was in bad debt, incurred and accumulated by my husband for years. My sister in law became pregnant with her third child and asked me if I wanted to work as a



domestic helper abroad to replace her. We decided that the high salary offered in Hong Kong would help us pay off the debt and so I left my nursing job to become a domestic helper. I felt pressured as I was unsure how I was going to repay the debt and how long it would take.

I was also looking for things I could do in my free time on Sundays. I saw a Facebook



advertisement for "Lunch and Learn" at Enrich. and from then attended other Enrich workshops. With Enrich, I was able to pay off my debts within one year, and I eventually finished the full programme, graduated from Enrich and became an Ambassador



While I was in Hong Kong, I realized that saving money should begin from a young age, so I introduced financial education to my children I have been exceptionally impressed and genuinely humbled by Sheena's resolve, grit and boldness in realizing her goal of returning home in 2019. To have achieved this so far from home and without the immediate support of her family and friends is incredible. I have been very fortunate to have been part of Sheena's journey, and it's an experience that I will never forget."

I also joined the Enrich Long-Term Mentoring programme and worked with my mentor, David who had so much effort and patience with me. I found not just a mentor but a friend as well. David helped me organise all my business ideas.

I was able to go home after 5 years in Hong Kong. I was nervous but I prepared emotionally by attending seminars on business, leadership, social entrepreneurship. I planned my business and prepared my finances.



I am now managing my own online social enterprise, a Kuripot (convenience) store that I started in mid-2015. Part of the proceeds get donated to Filipino charities. I've also ventured into agriculture, investing in farming, poultry and planting vegetables and fruits, and we have plans to expand



in future. I am so thankful to Enrich for teaching me how to manage my own business, and to David who taught me how to keep a ledger, consolidate financial records and create business plans.



With the help of Enrich, I was confident in going back home and inspiring others to live with purpose. My advice to other domestic helpers is to focus on their dreams and do it the SMART way. Nothing is impossible for those who believe they can!"

Financial Education

Our financial literacy workshops focus on skills building and creating real behavioral change. We equip migrant domestic workers with knowledge, skills and tools, including basic budgeting, goal-setting, investment concepts/tools, how to identify investment scams, and ways to overcome debt. We also cover the fundamentals of entrepreneurship and support them in making decisions that create lasting changes to their financial behavior.



One-to-one Support

Individualised assistance is key. Our participants receive advice and guidance that is tailored to their circumstances. Our one-off and long-term mentoring programmes are a fantastic way for mentees to assess their progress with their mentors and build their confidence to continue towards their goals. Our financial counselling service enables migrant domestic workers in financial difficulties to access urgent and confidential advice

Outreach

To make sure that we reach as many migrant domestic workers as possible, we get out on the street, raise awareness on social media and partner with consulates, the media, other charities and community groups. Here are some of our outreach highlights from 2019.



Enrich Ambassador Programme

We were supported by 55 migrant domestic worker ambassadors in 2019. These superstars give up time on their day off to support our outreach and events, volunteering 138 hours last year.



Welcome sessions for new arrivals

We spoke to 11,415 newly arrived migrant domestic workers through 100 welcome sessions at the Philippine and Indonesian Consulates. 14,539

Street Outreach

We conduct outreach all over Hong Kong with our staff and ambassadors to raise awareness. of our programmes amongst the migrant domestic worker community. In 2019, we arranged 34 street outreach sessions.

Spreading the word online

We broadcasted 7 episodes of 'Ask the Experts', a regular Facebook Live video series answering migrant domestic workers' questions on a wide range of topics with industry experts, including the Hong Kong Police, consulates, lawyers, financial planners, other non-profit organisations and our own Enrich trainers.

The Value of Care Report

On March 8 (International Women's Day), we partnered with Experian to release the groundbreaking report 'The Value of Care' which revealed the economic contributions that migrant domestic workers make to Hong Kong, Singapore and Malaysia, as well as the levels of financial inclusion of these communities. We had a packed house at our launch event, which featured an expert panel discussion as well as a photo exhibition by domestic worker photographer Leeh Ann Hidalgo. The Value of Care was also featured in international and local media including CNN, TIME, Coconuts, SCMP, HKFP and more.








Congratulations Class of 2019!
